## "Interning Grace"

"Strike While The Iron Is Hot" by Intern Minister Tom Bozeman

It can be hard working towards something and not seeing any tangible results arise from our efforts – particularly if it's something about which we care a great deal and into which we have put in a great deal of time and thought and sweat. When it comes to making a difference in society – when the scale of what we are attempting to impact gets so large – the challenge of actually making an impact can seem formidable. This is why it's so important to "strike while the iron is hot".

This past Sunday afternoon, I attended for the first time the monthly Boston Racial Justice Brunch, at which white folks gather to build community around, to educate one another about, and to collaborate on taking action on issues of racial justice. In the room were people who have been doing this work for many years – sometimes decades. At one point in the conversation, one of the people in the room who's been at it for decades commented that the conversation about race that we were having with one another was far beyond the one that was going on ten or fifteen years ago – that she could see the growth and maturation of our ability to talk constructively about race. Another long-timer commented that, for the first time, she is having conversations about race with people who don't normally think or talk much about it.

The iron is hot, my friends.

At the end of this month, on the evening of Friday, January 30, we will be holding a conversation in the Assembly Hall. We'll be talking about what's been happening in Ferguson, MO and spreading around the country. We'll be engaging with the vital question of what we are to do in light of the times in which we find ourselves. I hope that you'll join us.

# January Special Collection for Big Creek People in Action

The FPC HIP group (our high school youth) will be traveling to McDowell County, West Virginia during their April school break for a service learning mission trip. McDowell County WV is one of the poorest counties in the United States –  $6^{th}$  poorest to be exact. Big Creek People in Action (BCPIA) provides many services to the people in their county including a youth leadership program, an education and literacy program as well as their housing program through which they provide safe, warm and dry homes to the residents of the county.

BCPIA also hosts volunteer church and college groups throughout the year who want to make a difference by giving their time and energy to our community. Our youth and their chaperones will be staying in dormitory style rooms at the group's center. They will also benefit by cultural immersion in the music, dance, work and stories of the area as well as a tour of a coalmine and the community.

BCPIA provide home repairs needed by the elderly, poor, or disabled residents of Big Creek District. The Special Collection will be targeted specifically to assist in their housing rehabilitation project so that the group from our church can go, not only with their hands and hearts, but also with a monetary donation. ## HOMELESS COUNT

Good Day Friends,

During the week of 26 January 2015, once again, I will be involved with the annual homeless count in Brockton that is run by Father Bill's / Main Spring.

We take to the streets around 9:30 PM and travel to places where the homeless are known to take cover. We offer these people shelter, warm clothing, food and blankets.

Some of these people have mental health issues and some are on the streets year-round due to lack of housing. Much of the data that we collect is processed and sent to Federal and State agencies that we hope will assist these people in collecting Section 8 housing certificates as well as grants for general housing services.

During the next few weeks, I will have boxes at First Parish for any donations of winter hats, gloves, long underwear and toiletries for this event.

Thanks to all in advance for your continued generosity in helping with this effort to end homelessness near our community!!

Although of very high quality, the portable microphones seem to work best in capturing the human voice in singing, by persons highly experienced in their use. They are much less forgiving of the casual lay speaker who does not speak directly into them from very close. Using the cell fund grant we have purchased a new microphone that should be easier for most of us to use (and be heard). Final installation should be complete shortly. Please let us know if you can hear the difference!

And, speaking of hearing from you, the Worship and Music Committee will be conducting a brief Worship Practices Survey of the Congregation, most likely in March. We'll be letting you know more about it in the weeks ahead. We plan on using a web-based tool called Survey Monkey to record and tabulate the data (paper copies will be available for those who do not have or prefer not to use the web. ## Pre-School Proposal to be discussed at After-Church Meeting on Jan. 25

A proposal to use FPC religious education classrooms during the week for a private pre-school will be the subject of an informational, all-church discussion at noon on **Sunday, Jan. 25**, in the parlor. Ligaya Garan of Duxbury, a Montessori pre-school teacher, has approached the Building Use Committee with the proposal to rent two R.E. rooms from September through May, beginning next fall. The committee has held preliminary discussions with Ligaya and her husband and feels it is important to inform the congregation and other committees of the proposal and to get input.

If agreed to, the pre-school would be a significant new revenue source for the church, but it would have an impact on the way we use our facilities, and it might require additional work, attention and accommodation from the staff. The school would use two of the large classrooms, with the kitchenette and adjacent toilet, from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday. Some renovation/updating of these facilities would be needed. The school would also require the construction of an enclosed outdoor play space, which would be available for church use on Sundays.

Ligaya and her husband Peter, an architect, will present details of their proposal, with drawings, at the after-church meeting. Members of the Building Use Committee and the staff will be present to answer questions as well.

## Ukrainian Music for Violin and Piano to be Performed at FPC – March 22

Violinist Zachary Ebin and pianist Maria Dolnycky will play music by 20<sup>th</sup>-Century Ukrainian composers, some of it based on Ukrainian folk themes, in a concert at First Parish Church on Sunday, March 22, at 3 p.m.

Ebin and Dolnycky will also play some of the pieces during the morning worship service that day and will join Rev. Catherine Cullen in the pulpit to talk about the repression of Ukrainian composers during the Soviet era. Part of the proceeds from the concert will aid humanitarian relief in Ukraine, where the continuing civil war has caused great hardship for thousands of people.

Ebin was formerly the director of the Suzuki violin program at South Shore Conservatory in Hingham and Duxbury. He now studies and teaches in Toronto. He is a graduate of Brandeis University and Boston Conservatory and has studied with several internationally known violinists. Maria Dolnycky is a pianist and music teacher in Toronto. She studied music at McGill University in Montreal and at the University of Music and Performing Arts in Vienna. Her recitals have been broadcast on CBC and Radio Canada.

The two last year released a CD, "Dreams: A Revival of Ukrainian Music," containing seldom performed music by four Ukrainian composers. Admission to the concert will be \$20 for adults, \$15 for students and seniors, and free for children 12 and under.
