February 5th -- "*We Can't Keep Quiet*", Guest Speaker, Lisa Perry-Wood, "First they came for the Socialists and I did not speak out...Then they came for me and there was no one left to speak for me." At this time in our country's history, we are called, more than ever, to speak up for the marginalized. Tens of thousands of voices were heard at the Women's marches two weeks ago, but we can't go quiet again. How will you let your voice be heard?

February 12th-- "Practically Imperfect", Reverend Jill Cowie -- "Perfectionism is one of the scariest words I know", says spiritual writer Kathleen Norris. She goes on to say, "It is a marked characteristic of our American culture where we try hard to do the best we can yet always fall short of some imaginary, usually unattainable standard." Our Unitarian Universalist ancestors viewed perfectionism as growth. Come explore how we can live into their vision and of being practically imperfect. Understanding our identity in our first family says psychologist Andrew Solomon helps us go "where the spirit beckons" towards families of the heart.

Green Shoots

You may think January is too early for green shoots, but we have been seeing some in the RE program for children and youth. Last year we reported 36 children and youth to the Unitarian Universalist Association annual census of congregations. This year we will be reporting 51. It has been really encouraging that almost every week since Thanksgiving we have had visiting families and many folks are choosing to stick around and really check us out. I'm not entirely sure who we have to thank for this uptick in visitors (maybe Donald Trump?) but I am grateful and glad it is happening. But, I do know that new folks are not here just to meet me or the RE teachers. They are here looking for a church community and that means all of you. So, here are some things you can do to help us grow the RE program and build a strong foundation for the church's future:

- If you see someone who seems unsure about where they should be for the service or for RE on Sunday mornings, please speak to them, offer to show them where to go.
- If you see someone (anyone!) standing alone at coffee hour, go up and introduce yourself.
- If someone asks about the church or our programs, remind them of our website <u>www.uudux.org</u> where there is lots of detailed information. We also have pamphlets near both entrances to the sanctuary.
- Take a moment to think about what you would want if you were new and resolve to do that for any new folks you see.

I know we are New Englanders and we take pride in respecting peoples' privacy, but if people are looking for community, they are not going to find it if we don't reach out.

And there is one more easy thing you can do to support the church's young people. Come downstairs some Sunday and look around. Think about what our facilities would look like to a new family. Our RE space is beloved and well used, but let's be honest here, it has seen better days. There are plans being worked on for a refresh - a coat of paint, new ceilings and doors, etc. This isn't about our space competing with kiddie gyms and fancy playgrounds. It is about making a concrete statement that the people downstairs are just as important to the church as the people upstairs in our lovely assembly hall. Please, won't you help us tend and cultivate these new, green shoots?




February is Small Group Sign-Up Month
