A MESSAGE FROM YOUR MINISTER ...

This Mother's Day will be my first since my mother's passing--I offer these thoughts to you (and to me) from a sermon I preached some years back

Some of us here did have mothers who loved us deeply... But some of us were not well nurtured by our mothers. ...Some of our mothers were incompetent, neglectful or troubled. Some of our mothers were wounded or longing or dying. Some of our mothers were cruel and abusive.

And in some extreme cases, some of our mothers did us great harm. Sometimes mother and child simply brought out the worst in each other, like a kind of allergic reaction.

There was a time when we struggled with our relationship-- my mother and I. We were different people, born in different times. When we look out of one window, my mother and I see very different things. But some time ago, I have made peace with my mother. It's said that the secret to serenity is finding delight and joy in what is. Sometimes when I look for my mother's support and encouragement, it simply is not there. My mother is not perfect, but what she's able to offer me is decidedly hers, --- *and decidedly good enough*. I find ways to bless my mother and to stay connected in the midst of all our mutual imperfections.....

But this Mother's Day I am remembering that the most important gift I can give to my children, the most important gift that we each can give to one another, is the gift of loving and caring and staying connected in spite of all of our imperfections.....

Blessings on those mothers who loved us well. Blessings on those mothers who loved us as well as they could. Blessings on those who gave us life. Blessings on those who showed us how to live it. Blessings on *good enough* mothers everywhere!

Making Our Criminal Justice System More Just

Inspired by our service on this topic last fall, several members of the Social Justice Committee have been working with the Mass Bail Fund, which expanded its operations to Plymouth County just last month. To date, five people have been bailed out of the Plymouth jail by a Mass Bail Fund volunteer, and two have been bailed out in Plymouth County courthouses. An all-volunteer organization, the Mass Bail Fund was created in 2013 by a group of public defenders and social workers in response to the practice of putting people in jail because they cannot afford bail. The Mass Bail Fund provides poor defendants with up to \$500 bail. Thus far, they have bailed out about 250 people in Suffolk, Worcester, Essex, and now, Plymouth County. Half of all 250 cases have been settled and in half of those, the charges were dismissed; that's more than 60 people who might have been incarcerated pre-trial have poorer legal outcomes. Being incarcerated can mean losing your job and/or your housing; it can mean missing critical medical appointments/treatments, and even losing custody of your children.

We are looking for FPC members and friends interested in serving as volunteers for the Mass Bail Fund. Volunteers go to the Plymouth jail and actually post bail. We are also trying to line up volunteers who would be able to go to Plymouth County courthouses during the daytime to post bail for women who will otherwise be incarcerated at MCI-Framingham. We are rapidly becoming two societies in America and this is one way you can gain an appreciation for the problems facing poor people in this country while playing a critical role in mitigating one of the injustices in our criminal justice system.

There will be a training session Friday, May 6 at 11:00 at the UU church in Brockton. Social Justice Outreach Committee – FPC Grant to UU Urban Ministry

In March, the Social Justice Outreach Committee awarded \$2500 of FY 16 cell funds to UU Urban Ministry for their Summer Activities Program. UUUM offers young people from Roxbury and nearby neighborhoods safe, fun and stimulating activities during the summer.

Elementary Students: Summer Campership Program, an Arts Intensive Program conducted by UUUM's partner and neighbor, *Roxbury Community College*, will enroll 20 elementary students, offering them a wide range of arts-related activities, workshops, exercise and "before / after care" and tutoring each day. The program provides subsidies up to \$400 for 10 campers to attend Arts at Park in Brookline.

High School Students: Youth Employment Program offers 12-15 teens a source of income and meaningful work experience, fostering skills for academic and professional success. UUUM partners with *Boston Youth Fund*, which helps pay youth salaries.

Our FPC Cell grant helps change the lives of Roxbury children and youth during the summer. The Summer Activities Program is managed well. UUUM leaders have strong relationships with their community partners, the students and their parents. UUUM staff are very grateful to FPC UU Duxbury for our support! Thank you, First Parish Church! Bylaws Task Force

At the request of the Governing Board, a task force has been reviewing the bylaws during the past several months. We will be proposing several amendments during each of the next two or three parish meetings, starting with the Annual Program Meeting next month.

At this meeting, we will present the following changes for consideration:

- A series of 'housekeeping changes' that will not alter the intent of existing bylaws.
- Moving an age-based voting restriction clause from Article VI, Section E to Article IV, Section B
- A change in language of Article IV, Section C that deals with removing an individual from membership. Current language reads "The Governing Board may remove from

membership any person who has made no recorded financial contribution since the beginning of the previous fiscal year and *who shows no interest*, in the judgment of the Governing Board after reasonable investigation, in continued membership."

The new language would read "The Governing Board may remove from membership any person who has made no recorded financial contribution since the beginning of the previous fiscal year and *does not participate in the life of the church* in the judgment of the Governing Board after reasonable investigation. "

• A change in language of Article VI, Section C 2a, 3a, and 4. As a result of this change, minutes of the Annual Program Meeting will be read at the next Program Meeting, minutes of the Annual Finance Meeting will be read at the next Finance Meeting, and minutes will not be read at any Special Meeting.

At present, minutes will be read at the next meeting of the parish, so that Program Meeting minutes are read at the Finance Meeting and vice versa, unless there is a Special Meeting of the Parish. More substantively, we recommend the following changes:

- Article VIII, Section D, Adding language to prohibit any at-large member of the Governing Board from chairing a committee in his/her group.
- Article VIII, Section G, Adding 5e, an additional category that calls for an executive session of the Governing Board.:

e. issues pertaining to an individual Member or Friend of the parish.

- Article VIII, Section J Delete in entirety. This section describes the number, purpose, and timing of meetings of committee chairs, called by the Governing Board. In our opinion, this is a policy matter that should not be in the bylaws.
- Finally, we recommend a change in the bylaws covering the Music and Worship Committees to reflect the fact that this is now a combined Worship/Music Committee.

Many of you rose to the challenge to increase your pledge by 3% and for that we are very grateful. If you were unable to increase or even if you had to decrease a little, we are very grateful for those pledges as well. We are a community and each pledge counts towards the greater whole. As of press time, 96 out of our approximately 125 total pledging units have pledged \$166,645!!! We are almost to our goal of \$185,000. (A three percent increase from last year.) This will give our Finance Committee a good basis from which to start putting together the budget for next year. Of course if we go over the goal a little bit that's even better!



Financial Aid Available for College-Bound Students

First Parish Church has resources to help with college costs. Students who are themselves members of First Parish Church, as well as the children of church members, who will attend an accredited college or university next fall are invited to apply for the 2016-2017 Means Scholarship and/or a Hamilton Loan.

One Means Scholarship in the amount of \$3,000 will be awarded to the applicant with the highest GPA over 2.7. In the event of a tie, two scholarships will be awarded. Applicants must have already been accepted by a college or university that is accredited by an organization recognized by the US Department of Education. If the student selected to receive the scholarship decides to defer college,

the Trustees will hold the award for one year. Interested students should contact Jeanne Penvenne, chair of the Trustees, by mail or email by **June 1, 2016.** Please state the name of the college you will be attending next fall and your High School GPA. Please include a copy of your High School transcript. Also include a phone number where you can be reached and your home address.

Qualified students (children of a church member, or church members themselves, who will be attending an accredited college or university in the fall) who are interested in receiving loans from the Hamilton Loan fund should contact Rudy Langner. The amount of any one loan will not exceed \$2,500. Students and their parents will both be asked to sign promissory notes, agreeing to repay the loan within three years after graduating, or if they do not graduate, within one year after terminating their studies. The loans incur no interest if repaid on time. Loans not repaid on time will accrue interest. There is no deadline for applying for a Hamilton Loan.
