# Minister's Message continued from page 1 . . .

Autumn is the season of letting go. Just look around you and stop for a moment to watch a falling leaf. Do you know what causes leaves to fall from the tress in the autumn? According to Highlights For *Children*, here is the answer:

"When winter approaches, our part of Earth receives less sunlight, and the air grows colder. When these changes happen, trees prepare for winter. Trees that drop their leaves seal the spots where the leaves are attached. Then fluids cannot flow in and out of the leaves, which change color and fall off.

The falling of the leaves does more than mark the season. It also helps the tree survive the cold, dry air of winter. In the warm seasons, leaves use sunlight, water, and air to make the tree's food. In that process, the tree loses a lot of water through tiny holes in the leaves. In winter, the tree does not get enough water to replace what it would lose through the leaves. If the tree did not seal the spots where the leaves grow, it would die. When spring brings warm air and fresh water, the tree will sprout new leaves and start growing again."

Well, my friend, I think that it's the same for us. Let go of the ways you thought life would unfold, the holding of plans or dreams or expectations --- this is the only way for us to make it through the wintry seasons of our lives. And like the trees, when we let go and find the place of rest and peace, certain transformation will be ours!

What plans, dreams or expectations do you need to let go of at this point in your life?

Blessings on your letting go--know that you will indeed move on, to unknown shores beyond your wildest dreams!!

# Sunday, October 11, 10:30 - Noon Hunger Walk 2015

On Sunday, October 11, 2015 our young people ages 3 through grade 8 will be walking to raise money to fight hunger by supporting Heifer Project International. A one mile route has been established on the roadways through the cemetery. The high school youth (grades 9-12) will help with security and directions.

## **President's Letter**

Welcome to October. This is the time of the year for the Annual Financial Meeting of the Parish: Sunday, October 4<sup>th</sup> at noon. The Warrant has been posted and includes reports from the various financial committees, consideration of the budget, a change to an Endowment Fund, and changes to how we allocate cell funds. #### CHURCH FINANCES - NOT YOUR HOUSEHOLD BUDGET

FPC's finances are complex but needn't be confusing. I'd like to suggest that you not think of them as analogous to your household budget. They are different and there are several reasons why.

1FPC's year is a fiscal year that runs from July 1 to June 30<sup>th</sup> of the following calendar year. We have a start and end date to be able to close the books and report our position at the end of the (fiscal) year. For the Operating Budget, we want to know how close we came to meeting our budget. We also report the status of the other two areas of finance, the Endowment and the Cell Funds.

- 2. Every number in our budget has been researched, studied and planned. We look at historic information and adjust revenue and expense categories to help create a new budget.
- 3. The budget lasts from July 1 to June  $30^{th}$ ; nothing is carried over. If you don't spend your committee budget, the balance reverts to the general church funds. You can't spend someone else's budget, even if you know they aren't going to use it.
- 4. If we have a bad financial year, the money to make up for any shortfall in the budget can only come from prior year surplus funds.
- 5. We can, and have, borrowed from our Endowment and Cell Funds.
- 6. We try to consider the future of the church, not just next year, but 50 years in the future.

Generally it appears that we are in pretty good shape. We have three fundraisers planned for the year, so mark your calendars for Decemberfest – the first Saturday in December, the Silent Auction in February, and the Summer Fair in June. Don't forget to join the fun.

We will be having a Committee Chair's meeting on October 8 at 7:30 in the Hall. It is very important that every committee be represented –expect lots of information on how things work at FPC.

Thanks to the Membership Committee for the new name tags. Please keep yours at the church rather than home.

At our last Board meeting we approved a change to the Building Use Policy regarding the Boy Scouts in recognition of new BSA policies eliminating national restrictions barring participation by gay scouts and leaders. We hope that the Boy Scouts will continue to make progress on issues of inclusion.

## **By the Numbers**

It has been a busy month, settling in as your new Interim Director of Religious Education, meeting everyone and starting the program year. I have especially enjoyed my work so far with the high school HIP Group. I know this group was a special passion of your former DRE, Sunsue and it shows. It is a wonderful, lively group of 17 teenagers. They have all kinds of plans for the upcoming year. I am also looking forward to getting to know our Coming of Age group, the 7-8 graders. These 11 young people are in for a fun year, full of spiritual and personal growth. Coming of Age is a touchstone program in most U.U. congregations and we plan to work hard this year to make it special for our kids.

I also lead my first children's chapels, one for the youngest children and another for the children in grades 2-6. The chapels were warm and meaningful. It was lovely to see the connections these children already have with each other and the church, even at such a young age. However, the total number of children in both chapels combines was 8. Yes, you read that right, 8. Right now, we have 6 children registered in grades Pre-K – 1 and 8 children registered in grades 2-6. Now, it is still early and we may get a few more registrations in, but clearly this is an area that demands our attention now. If we cannot attract more families with very young children, there will not be a Coming of Age or a HIP group in a few years.

You should also know, that we are not unusual. The Lutheran church reports declines of 40% or more in Sunday school attendance and other denominations report even steeper declines. Perhaps the most important task of the interim period in religious education here is to decide, as a church, how to address this issue. But, in the meantime, there is something we all can do. We are blessed with a tradition that includes lots of fun activities outside of Sunday morning RE classes. In October alone we have the Hunger Walk as well as all the Halloween events. All these activities are a perfect opportunity for all of you to invite your friends and neighbors to join us. It can be a hard sell to get a child to Sunday School, but who doesn't like carving pumpkins or making a difference in the world?
