Ringing in the New Year!

Welcome back and so many thanks to everyone who made all our holiday festivities so special. We will be trying some (sort of) new things this January and enjoying some old favorites. On the sort of new side, the children in grades K-6 will spend six weeks (January 10 – Feb. 14) exploring all the meanings of home – comfort, belonging, identity, spiritual and material. This multi-age project is called "The Heart of Home." They will be building the Church Streetardboard houses, as a part of their exploration. (**If you have any large cardboard boxes, we would appreciate the donation.**) On Feb. 14 we will have an intergenerational service with a presentation by the younger children and also a contribution from the youth and adults who went on the mission trip to West Virginia last year.

The interim process is largely a matter of sifting through old and new ideas and trying to determine what suits us today. It is always important to keep in mind that the underlying mission of the R.E. program is to provide a spiritual home for our children. The details, shape or size of that program may change with the times – much like your winter coat, that keeps you warm, probably looks different from the one you wore as a kid – but the mission remains the same. You will be asked to dream, but also to tell us what tradeoffs and compromises you might be willing to make. We live in a world of limited human and financial resources and we must be wise stewards of those resources.



99 to 1

How Wealth Inequality is Wrecking the World and What We Can Do About It followed by book sales and signing in the Harvey Assembly Hall



The focus of the worldwide Occupy protests is creating a world that works for 99% of people and businesses, not just the richest and most powerful 1%. But who are the 99%? Who are the 1%? How extensive and systemic is inequality in different areas of society? What are its causes and consequence? How is inequality changing in our world? And what can be done about it? For many years Chuck Collins has been a top leader in studying, speaking about, and writing about these questions. In this book he brings together in one place, for the first time, information that has been widely scattered in many different articles, reports, and websites.

The 99 to 1 How Wealth Inequality is Wrecking the World and What We Can Do About It Service is sponsored by the Social Justice Committee.

Chuck Collins' book, 99 to 1, is our First Parish Church "All Church Read". A special collection will be taken for our local Head Start Schools that serve our community's poorest and most vulnerable children ages 2.9 to 6 years.

Special Collection for Head Start on Jan. 24th

Chuck Collins, author of <u>99 to One</u>, will speak about the inequality that causes so many families to have both parents working at low paying jobs, anxious about meeting the daily needs of their family. For them Head Start is the answer to childcare and to a pre-school experience that helps them learn how to learn. Head Start's commitment is to give every vulnerable child an opportunity to succeed.

However, federal funding for Head Start has been lowered over the years. Students enrolled at Head Start are the poorest and most vulnerable children ages 2.9 to 6 years old. The students have social, emotional and behavioral skill development needs on top of academic school readiness skills. Our local Head Start schools have an annual budget of \$50 per classroom for field trips. Children stay inside in the winter due to lack of proper winter outerwear and/or the unaccessible playground and when the children do go outside, they play in small playground with plastic toys.

Children do not have a chance to learn about the outside world of nature. There is not enough money to bus a class to a zoo, a farm, a park, or a museum. There is not enough money to have experts in nature or history come to a class.

We will have a special collection for our local Head Start school to provide materials, field trips, and teacher training. Head Start will use the funds to help develop the social, emotional, behavioral and school readiness skills that our community's most vulnerable children require. Our collection will be on Jan 24th. Checks should be made out to First Parish with Head Start in the memo.

Organ Restoration Fund Drive Nears Goal

Thanks to the generosity of church members and friends and the community at large, our organ restoration fund drive has raised more than \$34,000 in the past month. The public appeal's goal was \$40,000, to match \$40,000 pledged from cell funds by the church's Governing Board. With one major gift promised but not yet received, it is expected that the drive will reach or surpass its goal this month.

With the success of the drive in sight, the Organ Restoration Task Force is working to develop a contract with the Andover Organ Company to rebuild the tracker-action organ, which was built in 1853 by Boston organ builder William B.D. Simmons. The actual restoration work will begin a year from now and is expected to take about ten months. The organ will be removed from the choir loft after next Christmas and taken to the company's workshop. It is expected to be reinstalled before Thanksgiving of 2017.

The total cost of the project, which will include a slight expansion of the instrument, is estimated at \$465,000. Before launching the public appeal, we had raised \$382,000. Although the goal has nearly been met, donations are still being accepted. They may be one-time gifts or pledges to be paid by September 2017. If the drive exceeds its goal, we will be able to reduce our use of cell funds, leaving those funds available for other church projects. They have reached their goal so in a few days we will sign a contract with Andover Organ to restore our organ, with the work scheduled to begin after this year's Christmas Eve Service. Thanks to everyone who participated.

There are a couple of concerns that have been brought up recently that I will pass on here.

The shed is used by the Social Justice Committee as a gathering place for donations to the Box Project. We need to keep the tables empty and the space open. People have also placed items in the shed without protection; crowding in the shed requires moving these items around which is difficult and can cause damage.

Worship & Music Committee Report on Actions Taken as a Result of the Spring 2015 Worship & Music Survey

Our thanks again to the Congregation for their efforts to complete our most recent survey and to provide thoughtful feedback on our worship practices. With nearly 180 responses we believe this survey had among the broadest participation of any recent survey done by the church.

The survey results have been used by the Committee to both reaffirm some practices and to initiate small changes in others.

Among the areas where our analysis of the survey results indicated that some adjustment in our practices, or emphases in our practices might be appropriate included the following: (1) making more use of a variety of prayer practices during our worship services; (2) planning for more intergenerational worship services as part of our worship calendar; (3) planning for including more musical styles as part of our worship practice; and (4) improving the sound system. (Note in regard to this last point: We are making progress, including advanced discussions with potential vendors, in plans for a further upgrading of our sound system.) The committee is working hard to implement these adjustments in ways that are supportive of the diversity of views within the congregation. In other areas the worship survey results supported continuation of a number of our practices. For example, there was broad support for the quality and variety or range of Catherine's sermons. That was certainly reassuring and very valuable information to have. Similarly, the congregation was supportive of entrusting Catherine and the Worship & Music Committee with the broad discretion to select themes for worship services, including the focusing of particular Sundays on the work of various groups or committees in the church, (e.g. Youth, Alliance, Welcoming Congregation, Social Justice, etc.) Thus no major changes are likely there, except as individual circumstances might make appropriate. The manner in which Joys & Concerns and Announcements are recognized also received broad support, thus reaffirming continuation of our current practices.

The Worship & Music Committee strives to help make the worship experience at the church as meaningful and as supportive of the spiritual needs of the congregation as we possibly can. If you have any comments or concerns, please bring them to the attention of our Chair, Jim Hamilton, or any of the other members of the Committee.

We are in touch with Lorant on a regular basis and are fortunate that he is a good friend whose English is a whole lot better than our Hungarian. He cares deeply about his church, and worked tirelessly to help get it built. It is important to understand that the bells in the church are a symbol of the congregation's religion. The Unitarian church stands in the town of Nyaradszereda surrounded by three churches who have bells.

Dear Friends. In occasion of this Christmas season we the Board of Trustees from Nyaradszereda think with love to you and we wish you all the best in this holy season of years! We are happy to be partner church with you. We started this journey at 2004 when we started our building project. Meanwhile we visited you and you visited us, too. Right now in our church building we have electric heating on our benches and also thermo-motive system for heating the air inside the building. We are not going to heat outside the building with this thermo-motive system ... you may understand why:). But we do have other thing to do in outside the building: in tower we are working to have bells. We thank you for your donations for this purpose, and we also donate for this goal and we wrote applications for financial helps we also gained. We are closed to have financial base for a bell and now we hope to work with this in this coming year. We hope to have two bells, at list because this is important in our tradition and this is what the pragmatic present asking for. When we thank your donations for bells I am letting you know the results of this work we inform you about possibilities of donating in continuation for this second bell.
