From the Governing Board: The President's Report

In my last Bell Ringer report, I misstated the name of the person behind a recent financial donation to the church. He is the late James A. Hamilton (a former church member whose name you may recognize from the bookplates in the hymnals). His descendants made a donation to the church from their grandmother's trust fund in the amount of \$3,585. This money will go to the trust fund responsible for paying for ministerial interns.

The Pandemic Fundraising working group, of which I am a member (along with Jay Bray, Sharon Nabreski, Pat Slechta, and Tracy Wagner), is moving forward with plans for a hybrid Service Auction event to take place in April. See elsewhere in the Bell Ringer for more information. We are also confident that we will be able to have the Summer Fair this year. Start collecting your stuff!

Regarding the parsonage, the Governing Board voted by e-mail prior to our February meeting to approve two expenditures. One was to start the process for de-leading certification. I can now report that the interior work is complete. The external work is yet to be done and will happen this spring. The Governing Board also voted to approve the installation of a fence that will allow a safe place for children to play without concern from 3A traffic.

Elsewhere in the Bell Ringer you will see an update from me about the Envisioning the Meeting House in the 21st Century survey that was conducted in February.

Envisioning the Meeting House in the 21st Century February 2022 Survey Results

In February, the Envisioning the Meeting House in the 21st Century put out a survey on our historic tablets and the wording on the crown molding above the pulpit. We were looking to narrow down the various possibilities that arise based on the consensus from the November workshop with consultant Scott Tayler that the historic tablets should be moved or covered.

At a recent church-wide Zoom meeting, we presented the results of that survey. The full presentation can be found at **Envisioning Survey**. Here is a short summary of those results:

- Sixty-three people responded to the survey
- Nearly three quarters of respondents wanted the tablets removed
- More than half wanted the tablets to be put in storage while we consider a more permanent solution while 27% would like to see them displayed somewhere on church property
- Asked about what should go in their place, a third of respondents thought it should be meaningful words or phrases from the UU tradition while about a quarter preferred symbolic artwork such as a chalice; another 18% suggested nothing be put in their place
- While deciding what to put in their place, two thirds wanted to take the tablets down and paint
 the walls white (leaving them blank in the interim) while about thirteen percent wanted to see
 them covered with a temporary piece of drapery or artwork
- Regarding the crown molding, nearly half wanted to replace the words with a UU statement of welcome or spirituality while about 24% thought we should remove the crown molding entirely
- Regarding the drapes behind the pulpit, nearly 35% thought that the drapes should be removed as well while 27% wanted to see them replaced with something else
- Asked for additional comments, 41 of the 63 respondents made a statement (see the PDF for more detail on that)

As for next steps, the working group will develop a draft proposal and circulate it for feedback. We encourage you to submit your proposals to the working group during this process. The working group will then finalize a proposal and bring it as a motion to be voted on at a special meeting of the parish to take place early in May.



The National Center for Lesbian Rights (NCLR) is the first national LGBTQ legal organization founded by women and brings a fierce, longstanding commitment to racial and economic justice and our community's most vulnerable.

Since 1977, NCLR has been at the forefront of advancing the civil and human rights of our full LGBTQ community and their families through impact litigation, public policy, and public education. Decades ago, NCLR led the way by establishing the first LGBTQ Immigration Project, Transgender Rights Project, Youth Project, Elder Law Project, and began working to end conversion therapy through what is now the Born Perfect campaign.

Homeless Count in Brockton Thank you!

Good day everyone! Please accept this letter as a heartfelt thank you for your generosity helping out through donating winter warmth for Brockton's people in need.

This past Wednesday was the annual statewide homeless count. I volunteered helping along side representatives from the Brockton mayor's office of social services, management from Father Bill's Mainspring House, and volunteers from the local veteran's hospital.

From 6:30 to 11:00pm we covered different sections of Brockton where people are in need of housing, drug and alcohol rehab, as well as psychological assistance. We walked along the train tracks leading to the old tent city, behind shopping malls and through woods leading to abandoned factory buildings. It was cold and wet, remnants of last week's storm.

We met up with people sleeping in home made tents and distributed blankets, back pacts filled with hats, gloves, bag lunches and health products. We spoke with them, asking about their origins, needs and if they would like food or any assistance. A few were willing to talk and accepted a backpack while some refused any assistance.

Yes, there were those who are in need of housing and there are those who need psychological help as well. I noticed empty alcohol containers as well as empty packets of Narcan.

This to me was disturbing, it used to be homelessness was a matter of someone temporarily down on their luck or out of a job. There is a lot of work to be done to help these individuals and families obtain the help they need through volunteer programs as well as government programs that are paid via tax revenue that is not getting through to them.

I'm not talking about socialism, this is a humanitarian issue that has not been addressed the way it should be.

Once again, thanks to all for your amazing generosity in helping better the lives of people that cannot do it by themselves.

Thankful to have a roof over my head and food in my belly!

Purim is a festive Jewish holiday where we celebrate with costumes, noisemakers, and parties.

Purim commemorates a time when the Jewish people living in Persia were saved from a threat of national genocide. The story involves the brave Queen Esther, her uncle Mordechai, King Ahasuerus and the evil Haman. Haman, angry that Mordechai would not bow down to him, asked King Ahasuerus to allow the extermination of the Jews in Persia. However, Queen Esther, who has not yet revealed to the king that she is Jewish, approaches him and reminds him of how Mordechai, a Jew, once saved his life. Because the Jews of Persia were saved and Haman was punished, Purim became a holiday full of joy and happiness. Along with parades and costumes, we celebrate Purim by engaging in charitable acts and sending gifts of food to family and friends. As is customary for most Jewish holidays, there's also a special dinner, often including hamantaschen, a sweet three-cornered pastry filled with jam.

How the Tablets Came to Be By Carol Robison

In 1840, the winds of change had been sweeping through Duxbury, altering life in this quiet seaside village in profound ways. Enterprising members of the community had built substantial fortunes from the sea by building the finest of ships and sailing them to the four corners of the globe. The entire community was prospering economically, and exposure to diverse cultures had expanded their worldview.

A decade or so earlier, the religious landscape in town had shifted with the separation of church and state. For the first time in its history, First Parish was on its own financially. The church had already converted to Unitarianism under the spiritual guidance of the much beloved Rev. John Allyn. A number of parishioners abandoned First Parish in favor of newly established Methodist, Universalist, and Congregationalist churches on Washington Street. The remaining FPCers were largely first family descendants and shipbuilders and ship captains. They were people of means, forward-thinking in many ways, but resistant to any change that threatened their newly-achieved station in life.

By the late 1830s, some of the wealthier members had become dissatisfied with the perfectly serviceable Third Meeting House (1785). With a great deal of hubris and a blind eye to future costs, they lobbied for a grand new building, one more in line with their exalted status. The vote was close. They prevailed, but not without controversy. The old building was torn down, and our beautiful Fourth Meeting House, in the Greek Revival style, was constructed in its place.

Captain Gershom Bradford's tenure as the congregation's treasurer spanned the years leading up to and following the construction of the new building. His most enduring - and visible - contribution to the project was the commissioning of the two imposing tablets, filled with some of his favorite Bible verses, that flank the pulpit. Why these particular verses? We can only speculate. What we do know about him is that he was a master mariner. He went to sea at age 17 on board one of his older brother's ships. By the time he retired in 1826 after 35 years, he had commanded at least 10 ships. His wife Sally and three of their four daughters were active in the abolitionist movement. They also corresponded with and hosted many of the transcendentalist luminaries of the time.

When the dedication of the new building took place on October 28, 1840, the tablets had just been finished and presumably hung. We have the receipts:



Gershom Bradford paid S. V. R. Moore \$150 on October 21, 1840 for gilding and lettering two tablets.

Gershom Bradford paid Stephen Miller \$50 on October 23, 1840 for making the tablets.

\$200 in 1840 = \$6,463 in 2022.

The tablets are finely crafted works of art. The lettering is a perfect rendering of the King James Bible, right down to the spelling and punctuation. I do wonder why one of the 10 commandments (no graven images) is missing. Did the artisan just overlook it, or was it left out on purpose -?

A thread that runs through our history is openness to change. We have always evolved with the times and the needs of the congregation. Unitarianism developed in the early 1800s as a theological alternative to Calvinism. The tablets are actually evidence of this, 1840s-style. A weighty topic for another *Bell-Ringer*!
