Dear Friends

Another church year is about to begin---but NOT in the way we had expected. Last June I think many of us assumed come September, with all the folks here in Massachusetts who've been vaccinated, our shared church life might begin to resemble something "normal" this fall. AND THEN CAME THE DELTA VARIANT!

Your Safe Congregations Task Force took the month of July off (our first break from bi-weekly meetings since March 2020). Last week we ramped up again---this new, highly contagious variant means we will have to resume meeting every other week, as we watch the progress of Covid-19 and continue to make recommendations for how we can safely gather in our Beloved Community.

SO THIS IS WHAT I *DON'T* KNOW, AS WE BEGIN THIS CHURCH YEAR (MY EIGHTEEN AMONG YOU!):

---I don't know what our Sunday morning worship life will look like this year. From the Governing Board: The President's Report

Here's hoping everyone had a great summer and is ready for Ingathering and a new church year! Your Governing Board met twice in August, once for a regular business meeting and once for our annual retreat. I will report about both here.

The Governing Board's August business meeting took place on Thursday August 19th (we typically meet on the third Thursday of each month, but we took a break in July). At the meeting we had a special visitor, Peter Smith, to discuss a fundraising idea that he shared with Mary Lynn Carson. This is still in the early planning stages, but it would relate to antiques and appraisals. More to follow. We heard reports from the Growth Team, Safe Congregations, the Racial Justice working group (which is also exploring environmental justice, as the two are tightly linked). We got an update from the Pandemic Fundraising team which reported that the planned September 26th fundraiser was being shelved for the moment out of concern for Covid. The Parsonage working group also reported, and is looking to do a walkthrough and assessment of the parsonage as soon as Catherine has moved out, which we anticipate to happen towards the end of September. We got an update from the Envisioning Our Meeting House in the 21st Century working group (more on this below and elsewhere in the Bell Ringer). We heard from the Treasurer about an early draft of the budget that forecasts a budget deficit of around \$9,000. The Governing Board is working with the Trustees, the Treasurer, and the Finance Committee on ways to close that gap. Work was done on McKayla Hoffman's employment contract as Youth Advisor, and I am happy to report that the document is complete and the contract signed. One last item was a Hamilton Educational loan award request. Since this was for my own daughter, and requires the signature of the chair of the Trustees, the Minister, and the Governing Board President, I felt it was right to bring it before the entire board. They approved a loan in the amount of \$2,500 for Olivia, who is doing her master's degree at the New School in New York City. I remind everyone that educational loans and grants are available from our church's trust accounts. Please feel free to contact me or any member of the Trustees if you have any questions.

As for our retreat, it took place on Sunday August 29th following the Fisherman's service. All eleven of us* (full list of board members below) met in-person in the Assembly Hall to prepare for the 2021-2022 church year. We did a deep check-in to learn more about what was going on in each other's lives. With Catherine's help we developed a covenant to guide our work together. We spent time discussing our goals for the coming year. We intend to make these quantifiable so at the end of the year we will know if we have achieved them. (You'll hear more from me on our goals in the coming months.) We had a fine pot luck lunch provided by attendees. We spent some time in the sanctuary doing the five questions exercise for the Envisioning Our Meeting House in the 21st Century initiative that I write about elsewhere in this issue of the Bell Ringer. One other important thing we heard about is Catherine's plan to take a sabbatical right after the Christmas Eve service and returning on Easter Sunday.

You will learn more about this in an all-church e-mail, that in all likelihood you will see before you receive this Bell Ringer.

We snuck a little business into the retreat and took a break to vote on two items. The first vote was to give Cindy Ladd Fiorini (also a town select board member) and Catherine permission to explore with the town the possibility of using the parsonage as temporary housing for Afghani refugees. You will learn more about this from Cindy in the weekly e-distro. The second vote was to authorize the spending of up to \$2,500 from the Memorial Fund to pay for a large tent to be used on the front lawn for Sunday coffee hour and other purposes (like the Summer Fair).



Please join us for a special Sunday Service, with a presentation by **Tim Turner, Director of Indigenous Education of Plimoth-Patuxet Museum.** His talk is inspirational as he describes the Native Peoples' way of life, their careful use of land and waters for providing for their families, and their earth-based spirituality.

To help us visualize their culture, he will show and pass around many artifacts, including stone and wooden tools, clothing, musical instruments, pottery, and toys. He is both gentle and understanding as he easily creates a conversation with all present.



Feed The Homeless

The Social Justice Committee helps feed the homeless in Plymouth by providing bag lunches every Tuesday.

Each week, two volunteers prepare 10 sandwiches, which they deliver to the shed at church. Another volunteer provides 20 individually wrapped desserts and delivers them to the shed by 9:30 on Tuesday morning.

At the shed, the volunteers put together 20 bag lunches, which, in addition to sandwiches, also include individual servings of fruit, juice boxes, and chips.

Bob Hughes takes the bag lunches to Plymouth each week and distributes them.

<u>An Update on the Envisioning Our Meeting House in the</u> <u>21st Century Task Force</u>

You may remember that in 2019, the Governing Board announced the creation of a task force with the following goal:

The Envisioning Our Meeting House in the 21st Century Task Force will establish and conduct a process whereby the entire church membership can engage in discernment about the appearance of the Meeting House interior, focusing on the area behind the pulpit. Included will be consideration of the two large tablets mounted on the wall behind the pulpit, the wooden cornice which has text on it, and the possible incorporation of Unitarian Universalist religious symbols. The Task Force will identify and work with an appropriate professional who will consult and facilitate the process. To afford ample time for conversations and considerations, this process will take place over at least two church years.

Late in 2019 the task force was formed and went to work. Then came the pandemic, but not before we identified a consultant, Scott Tayler (well known for the Soul Matters curriculum), to help guide us through the process. Covid caused us to aside our work until January of 2021, but have been meeting regularly since then. This fall you will see the process ramp up. There will be a number of small meetings taking place with various committees and groups of members and friends. Those meetings will focus on a set of five questions, and ideally will take place in the sanctuary. Here are those questions:

- What does our current sanctuary "say" to you when you are in it?
- What values do you think our current sanctuary "holds" and conveys?
- What feelings do you hope visitors and newcomers will have when they are in the sanctuary space?
- What have been your favorite moments in our sanctuary space?
- What has impressed you about other UU sanctuaries you visited or worshiped in?

We are currently planning to meet with the following groups, but will add others as necessary: the Governing Board; the Historical Committee; the Building & Grounds committee; the Growth Team; the Membership Committee; the Worship & Music Committee; the Small Group Ministry steering group & facilitators; the Trustees, Finance Committee, Assistant Treasurers, & Stewardship; the Religious Education committee (who we will look to for guidance on how best to approach youth & younger families); the Alliance; and the Social Justice Committee. We want to be sure that all voices are heard and will set up additional sessions as needed to meet that goal.

Late August was our first opportunity to test out these questions. We went through this exercise at the Governing Board retreat and are beginning the process of gathering feedback. You'll hear more from me through the fall as I will be writing monthly Bell Ringer updates on the Envisioning Our Meeting House in the 21st Century Task Force's activities. Testimonials at worship services will take place in

October. Then in November on the weekend of the 6th & 7th, Scott Tayler will be here for a worship service and a workshop. We will likely follow Scott's visit with a survey, and as we move into 2022 we will start the process of developing a plan that can be voted on at our June 2022 annual program meeting.

This will certainly make for an exciting year of thinking deeply about what our sanctuary means to us. If you have any questions about this process, please don't hesitate to contact me (jim@greenharbor.com, 781-724-6456).

Informational Meeting will be held the Sunday prior on September 19th.




Caring Connection Information
